
Food Contribution Request

Residential Sabah Jan' 2014

Learner Perspective

What's your first impression of Sabah? Wildlife? Mount Kinabalu? Well, let me tell you what it was like for us. It was about coexisting with nature, utilizing its many wonders, going outside of our comfort zone (away from the city, the internet, the social life) and giving back to the communities who are less fortunate.

On 6th of January, 46 brave IB students took on the challenge of a 5-day trip and 4-night stay to Sabah where they hiked the Mahua Falls, rafted down the Padas rapids and finally lending a hand to SK



(Sekolah Kebangsaan) Bukau, a school that makes due of anything they have and received. Packed with a busy schedule, there were no setbacks and the entire 46 IB students came home proud on the 10th of January as they successfully ventured out of their comfort zone, adapted and showed resilience when faced with obstacles.

On 6th of January, the 46 IB students rendezvous at KLIA where they took a 2 hour and 15 minute flight to KKIA (Kota Kinabalu International Airport). After landing in KKIA, the students went shopping

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for supplies to supply themselves until the next shopping area. Soon, they arrived at "7 Lodge" a 2 hour and 30 minute drive from KKIA. Settling down as soon as they got there, a briefing was then given to the students about the coming 4 days. On that night, a team building activity commenced where 4 teams were blindfolded and followed the verbal instructions from their leaders as to where they have to go. Using their senses other than sight and their will to keep moving on, each and every one of them completed the activity without complaints. Off to bed and they were ready for the next day.



The 2nd day proved to be one of the hardest days out of the whole expedition; jungle trekking. The students were filled with an appetising breakfast before the adventure for the day begins. They journeyed to the Mahua Falls, a 30-minute drive from 7 Lodge. From there, the excitement begins. 4 groups trekking on unfamiliar grounds with their respective tour guides whom are very experienced in the Mahua Falls. Quote of the day: "We had half the ecosystem on the soles of our shoes and half on our bottoms," well said Kenneth Choo and his group. All 4 groups stood tall and faced the obstacles that came into their path. They went in as a group, they pulled through as a group and they came out as a group. The journey up was fairly tiring as many slipped and fell; laughter would break out but soon cancelled by the screams of leech victims. The journey down was even more challenging as there were little spaces to firmly plant your foot in order to gain stability. After hours of trekking up and down, all 46 IB students made

it out alive, healthy and with heads up high. They were also rewarded with the cooling waters of the Mahua Waterfall, which cleansed all the dirt of their clothes. Nighttime came and the students explored a nearby small town where they were able to access shops and resupply themselves for the coming days.

Early the next day, we packed up and said our goodbyes to Tambunan and took the bus down to Tenom. We had originally planned to take the train to Pangi and whitewater raft from there, but a landslide last night meant we had to walk the entire (~11km) distance instead! It took us about two and a half hours, but when we got there, the Nexus team, still in high spirits, set off for Halogilat. The rapids were challenging and fun, and it was an unforgettable experience, the unique mix of fear and triumph that only actually rafting could adequately describe. When we got off, we had a train ride on an antique diesel train, and then got off at Beaufort and did some shopping for the meals in the days to come. At night, we pitched camps and cooked our own food, a novel experience for some and certainly a fun experience for many.

Day 4 was the day we finally got to teach primary learners. After a light breakfast, we packed up and loaded our stuff on the bus, then went to SK Bukau, situated some distance outside of Beaufort. At first, some people were apprehensive, as we didn't really know how to approach them. There were also potential language problems for the non-Malay speakers. But to our great surprise, the learners were really warm and welcoming, and had hours of educational fun that we had planned for them. One or two primary learners even asked a Nexus learner if they would like to visit their house! It was

with great sadness that we left, and headed out for Pantai Kenangan – 'the beach of memories', literally translated. We set up camps there again, but dinner tonight was different. In addition to our food, we had to create a campfire and cook our own fish. This we did, and the fires burned late into the night, as we all sat around it and discussed what had happened in the last four days.

Overall it was an amazing experience, and one that we would all willingly go through once again. Hey, you're only a teen once, eh?
