Primary

End of School Day

Our end of day procedures are becoming more and more difficult to apply due to the lateness of some parents to pick up their children. Here are a few of our current difficulties:

- Learners who are not taking part in a CCA on Tuesday or Thursday are being left in the cafeteria, often for the duration of the CCA period and sometimes beyond this. This causes supervision problems as all staff are occupied with running the CCA programme and meetings and there is no supervision.
 - Therefore we ask that parents collect their children at 3.05pm on Tuesday and Thursday if they are not joining an official CCA.
- 2. Some Primary aged learners are collected by their Secondary age siblings and wait by the Secondary 'pick up' point for collection. However some of the secondary age siblings then leave the area with their friends and so the Primary children are left in this area, unsupervised, sometimes until 7pm. Therefore we ask that parents speak to their secondary age children about responsibilities to stay with their Primary age sibling OR parents collect their children on time from the Secondary drop off area.
- 3. When Primary learners are not collected before 10 minutes after the end of the school day they are taken to the cafeteria and the parents of our younger learners are called. However there have been occasions when friends of the child's parents try to collect the learners and this causes confusion. Therefore we ask that if there are any changes whatsoever with collecting your child on time, you inform the school of the situation. Please do not assume that a friend can collect your child and please do not attempt to collect any other child without the parents informing the school.

Most of these issues can be resolved by parents collecting their children on time at the end of the school day. Many thanks for your co-operation and assistance in proving a safe and secure environment for your child.


Y7,8,9 Summer Bash!

In addition, the younger learners who are in the club inspire me because although the size of the bikes are too big for them, they still have the guts and spirit to ride the bikes!


All in all, I believe this activity benefits me by letting me to do fitness training outside of school, and at the same time giving me the joy to explore the places I've never been to.
