

#### On the jungle trek

The prospect of living in dense tropical forest for three days was at least, unprecedented and nerve-wracking for the majority of us; the trek, through the very steep terrain of the Kiulu Valley, was made more difficult by the unforgiving heat of the Bornean sun, as well as, the weight of 15kg rucksacks on our backs. Despite being hunched over in pain from physical exertion, melting in the searing temperatures, severely itching from the incessant mosquito bites, bruised and muddy from constantly falling on the slippery slopes, the first day of the trek taught us a newfound respect for the environment around us. We reached the first campsite after what seemed like an excruciatingly long time, set up our surprisingly comfortable (albeit claustrophobic) hammocks, and started a fire so we could produce something edible for lunch. Life in the jungle forced many of us to find a new level of independence and tolerance. For here, there are no housekeepers to clean up after you, no maids to make your bed, no cooks to lay the table with food, and no parents to shower you with affection. Adapting to such a different environment was extremely testing for me. However, it was only a short while before I found myself intrigued by how different and removed mother nature is from modern society, and it was a privilege for us to experience this wonder first-hand.



# Why I do CAS

#### DP CAS REFLECTION

Starting Nexus Community, I thought to myself, Nishi what are you doing? What are you putting yourself through? You hate kids, why do this? I convinced myself that providing a service towards these unprivileged Myanmar Learners, even though the thought of being able to get along with them was totally bizarre, was a good way to devote my time. This is a new role as I have never been in a position where I must be patient and engage with kids and actually genuinely get to know them. I have never really been a "kids person" as I did not have the patience, and so nexus community will hopefully allow me to become one. Also it is new because I must definitely consider the ethical implications of my actions around them, and provide a good example for them to follow so they can grow to be good individuals because right now they do not have their families to provide that example for them.

The first activity that I was lead was Just Dance, an interactive, minimal effort physical activity to be performed in a classroom. I personally enjoy dance and felt that it would satisfy the young learner's energy frenzies. I had to consider each song I was subscribing to the activity as I needed to gauge on the response of the learners to certain types of music, ie: I knew The Rolling Stones would probably not strike the same chord as Taylor Swift. When the activity started, the learners were enchanted by the graphics and participated enthusiastically alongside flailing team mates (the boys less so than the girls admittedly). However, I noticed the learners grew tired of the activity halfway through which reminded of the cons of short attention spans. This was coupled with technical issues faced with the equipment. From this, I learned to avoid dependency on technology as although attention-grabbing and instantly stimulating does not offer the same authentic interactions that other activities might.




An example of this would be an ill-organised day in the field. The session was supposedly dedicated to a game of Softball and Baseball but due to the overbearing language barrier, the instructions of the game was impossible to communicate to reach a level of proficiency in the game. Nonetheless, the session was spent well because we found the learners fully capable of entertaining themselves- they soon resorted to an excited session of flower-picking while the boys had one-on-one tackle sessions with some of my teammates. This session contrasted with the one I organised greatly because it relied on the energy of the present moment alone, it showed me how sometimes, it's the simplest moments that amount to the most meaningful. This session was also significant to me because it was when I fully realised by attachment to one of the learners- Eliyana. We would have little conversations that ran on sign language and share laughter about the frequent silliness of the boys. It was surprising to me because I don't usually get along with kids of that age and that was when I was suddenly aware of my progress of patience.

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

# **Reading At Home**

#### Children who read are ones who succeed





Top tips to help with reading at home Produced by the ELL Department

#### Get into a routine

Try to make reading a nightly routine.

#### Make reading enjoyable

Keep reading time relaxed, comfortable and pleasurable. Don't get impatient or pressurize your child

#### Maintain the flow

Don't correct too quickly. Allow time for the child to correct themselves which they will often do when they realize it doesn't make sense.

#### Be positive

Give praise for even the smallest achievements

#### Don't struggle

If your child is really struggling, take over the reading and let their teacher know

#### Prompt rather than correct

Prompt with the sound of the initial letter and see if you can sound out the word together

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#### When, where and how long?

- Choose a time and a place that will be both quiet and comfortable for you and your child
- \* Sit side by side so that you can both see the text.
- \*Read for 15 -20 minutes

#### **The Aims**

- To make reading an enjoyable experience.
- To give learners greater independence in reading.
- To show by example, that reading is a valuable and worthwhile activity.
- To improve learner's reading skills


#### What to read?
