






From our very successful trip to the Fire station, as the Exit point to Going Places topic, we jumped straight to our new IPC topic about Sand and water. Our Big Question this time is:


WHERE DOES WATER AND SAND COME FROM?

History Bee and Bowl by Ryan Lee

On the 8th of March, Mr Andres led a team of 6 Nexus learners into a battleground of memory work, passion, and idiosyncratic interests—The History Bee and Bowl (Malaysia Region). Our team of 6 pitted their wits against 3 other teams twice in the Varsity Bowl Championships pertaining facets of history—from the Emperors of Rome to the technological advancements of computer science in the 1990s; from the Prussian empire to Aztec civilisation; from King

Richard the Lionheart to the Arab Spring. Our team played against very formidable opponents and emerged with 2 wins and 4 losses- unfortunately not enough to make the Bowl finals in Thailand this summer. However, the Nexus team did very well for the Bee Championships, where players play as individuals to buzz in as many correct historical answers as possible- all based on their own personal knowledge. Ryan Lee from Year 12 emerged champion for the Senior Varsity category, single-handedly beating 3 members of Dalat International School team, which went on to win the Senior Varsity History Bowl, in the Bee finals. And for the Junior Varsity category, Jerrell Ong from Year 11 landed a bronze medal after an intense 6 way scramble for the title. It was a good day for Nexus.



Oxbridge Debating by Sue Yen

"On this stage, friendships will temporarily be broken all in the spirit of debating." Those were some of the first few words uttered by the MC at the Oxbridge and KTJ (Kolej Tuanku Ja'afar) Debating Forum.

We were introduced to the four key Oxbridge speakers, three of which were from the Oxbridge alumni. Ranging from a radio announcer,

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to a professor, to a politician, these four debaters displayed their extensive knowledge surrounding the motion, "This house believes that modern media is malignant and not maligned." In the most diplomatic, yet witty way, they fired arguments at one another in the hope of persuading and winning the hearts of us, the audience.

After the heated debate, we then dispersed into our respective groups for a fruitful workshop session guided by the Oxbridge alumni facilitators. In preparation of the main debate to follow, we brainstormed, mapped out strategies and sparked mini-debates on different aspects of the modern media; such as, the regulation of the media, education through the media and the effects of social media.

The battle of wits began. Representatives from respective groups presented their ideas, affirming their stance on these complex issues surrounding the modern media. As some first-timers faced their glossophobia (fear of public speaking), they were cheered on by the supportive audience. Meanwhile, for the more experienced debaters, it was a challenge trying to fit rebuttals and one's own points into 90 seconds of speaking time as compared to the usual 8 minutes in ordinary parliamentary debates, resulting in some speaking as if they were catching a train, or rapping without a rhythm.

Next came a round of impromptu debates where individuals had 5 minutes preparation time and 2 minutes to speak. Some were amazing in their control and content, others were amazing as they overcame the stammers and stutterings of speaking publicly and in such a forum.

Overall, the fiery debates and the nerve wracking moments on the podium were unforget-

table. After listening to the insights from the experienced Oxbridge alumni facilitators, we would never look at debating the same way again.
