
Physics Olympiad @Nexus




Enrichment Day


Throughout the rest of the secondary school, the collapsed timetable allowed for some fantastic enrichment learning opportunities.

'Year 7 Guess who?'

Textures and Colour

Year 7 learners are currently finishing their Texture and Colour topics and have produced some interesting final responses. They were introduced to line, pattern, warm and cool colours, and using their painting tools to create texture and background to their final responses.

In the visual arts, texture is the perceived surface quality of a work of art. It is an element of two-dimensional and three-dimensional designs and is distinguished by its perceived visual and physical properties. Use of texture, along with other elements of design, can convey a variety of messages and emotions.

Below are some of the learners final responses and a reflection writen by Emily from 7N:

In art this term, we have learnt about textures. We drew a profile of ourselves for our final responses. We started off by taking photos of ourselves from a side view - much like a mugshot. We then sketched the outline, the girls, had to leave out the line separating our hair from the shoulder. Then we made patterns made from only using line inside our body, while we used shapes - either circles, triangles, rectangles or squares of different sizes to make up our background. Afterwards, we used a black marker to go over our patterns then coloured in the background using either cool or warm colours.

I personally liked my final piece of work and I actually was able to finish it in the time set, which is an achievement itself as my time management skills are poor.

- 3. Production **teams of three** learners to be responsible for producing the film. (director, cinematographer, sound/editor etc)


The deadline for submitting your film is **27th May 2016**. There will be a screening of the winning films in June (date to be confirmed) There will also be prizes awarded in each category.



Upon arriving in school, learners contributed by adding to a Pi-Chain, with each new link a digit in the famously never-ending number. There was many a furrowed brow as Pi-Dingbats fever took over the school. Can you work out the puzzle below? Luanne (Year 13), Zhariff (Year 11) and Faizal (Year 6) scooped prizes for their impressive scores, whilst Miss Hayley proved unbeatable amongst the staff.

Finally, on Friday, learners paired up to take part in the Brain Drain Challenge on the field, which tested both their speed of thought and fleet of foot.


