Year 9 Probability Fair

Year 9 have been looking at probability in maths lessons. They played some different games which involved both theoretical and experimental probability in order to calculate the chance of winning and then worked in groups to design their own game. Their games were then trialed with year 6, who used tokens to play the different games. These tokens were used to determine which games were the most popular and which games had a higher or lower chance of winning. To tell you more, here is an extract from Jing Hui's blog. Introduction and Research

As a pre-lesson activity, we were introduced to probability and multiple games based on probability. In our first lesson, we had to play several probability games coined by the teachers. We had to work out the probability, the difficulty and give conjectures to making the game more biased.

Red or Dead

In this game, we basically had to randomly pick a uniform counter from a bag. There are 2 red counters and 10 yellow counters. If we picked a red counter, we win while on the other hand, if we picked a yellow one, we lose. The approximate probability of winning is as there were 2 red counters out of 12. To make the game biased and to change the probability further, we could add more yellow counters or take away a red counter, which would make the game harder to win.

Get In

The ball game was one of the most educational games to me, as I had to debate with Mr JP about the probability of winning. Basically, you had to throw a ball into a bucket from a determined distance, if you do, you win. This game had an experimental probability behind it (which I did not know at first). I kept thinking in a theoretical way which was false. I thought that there is only 2 outcome, win or lose, but that was false. Mr JP corrected me and told me that these type of game (same with football and skillful games) had to be solved

with experimental probability. The conclusion that Hafiz and I got from the game was that there was a \Box probability of winning. To make it more biased, we could increase the distance, change the ball weight and size and change the bucket size.

Production

We chose to produce and further our Counter Drop idea as we felt that it would be appealing and interesting to the young consumers and to finding out the probability respectively. Like Plinko, it was a board game, where you dropped a counter into a slot and let the counter bounce its way down a maze of alternating array of matchsticks. The matchsticks would be placed directly in between the two matchsticks preceding it. To win, the counter had to drop out of two of eight outcomes that do not have an x marked on it. So the initial probability that we told the year 6s were 2/8 or 25%, but it goes beyond that.



In a game like Plinko, the probability of winning is much more comprehensive and complicated than it seems. The game also comes with a bit of skill on the placement of drop the counter. For example, if I were to drop the counter in the first slot, it is unlikely to come out of the last slot. So, depending on the slot you drop the counter in, the probability of winning changes.

As you can see, the probability goes up like a curve. We chose this game as we felt it was the most feasible and logistically possible to make and do. Also, I conjectured that it would be the most profitable as this game is fast and quick paced, we can earn more profit and not have a queue when we display our game to the year 6s.


Fairground







26 MAY 2016

Good Afternoon.

To the graduating class of 2016 and to your parents, warmest congratulations as you complete your time at Nexus Putrajaya.

I understand from the school that you would like me share about what the future holds. Great, I have been sharing that same topic twice over the last week at the Launch of TISPC and also at the IB Graduation at Nexus Singapore on Monday.

On a bright Wednesday morning, the Year 12's embarked on a five hour bus ride to Mersing, Johor to complete their compulsory Group 4 science experiments. Exhausted from a week full of mock exams, extended essay deadlines, and endless procrastination, a full two nights and three day getaway from the IB life was much needed. With the entire year group boarding the bus, we left Nexus at around 9:00am. Within the five hours, learners entertained themselves from a range of card games, conversations, and music. However, one pass time everyone enjoyed was the sleep we could catch-up on.

Arriving at the resort at 1:00pm, we unloaded all of our science equipment and luggage and was warmly greeted by the resort facilitators and staff. Upon arrival learners sat around the dining area and lunch was served in order to replenish much needed energy for the activities planned out for the rest of the day. After being hastled into appropriate clothing and put into groups of eight people, the Year 12's began their trip with a small session on jungle survival in which we were given a timed teambuilding challenge to build a shelter off the ground along with a campfire with nothing but string, a lighter, bamboo planks, branches, and a tarp. With all teams managing to build a shelter able to withstand two learners (although some barely achieved this), we learnt to collaborate and communicate with each other as well as build stronger bonds between friendships. After completing the "Jungle Survival School" it was onto the final activity of the day; beach survival, where we learnt how to catch crabs, and fishes using both a long net and learnt how to catch clams using a traditional method involving a clam rake.

On Saturday most boarders visited the cinema to watch the exciting and captivating movie Marvel Captain America: Civil War.




